 - Therapeutic importance increasingly explored in other counseling approaches

Answer 1: Very little

I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ and him crucified. (1 Corinthians 2:2)

For what we proclaim is not ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord. (2 Corinthians 4:5)

Answer 2: Loads!

Paul's Thanksgiving

First, I thank my God through Jesus Christ for all of you, because your faith is proclaimed in all the world.

Romans 1:8

We ought always to give thanks to God for you, brothers, as is right, because your faith is growing abundantly, and the love of every one of you for one another is increasing.

2 Thessalonians 1:3

I was with you in weakness and in fear and much trembling (1 Corinthians 2:3)

God has exhibited us apostles as last of all, like men sentenced to death . . . To the present hour we hunger and thirst, we are poorly dressed and buffeted and homeless . . . We have become, and are still, like the scum of the world, the refuse of all things. (1 Corinthians 4:9-13)

I die every day! (1 Corinthians 15:31)

We do not want you to be unaware, brothers, of the affliction we experienced in Asia. For we were *so utterly burdened* beyond our strength that *we despaired of life* itself. Indeed, we felt that we had received the sentence of death. (2

Corinthians 1:8-9)

We are afflicted in every way. (2 Corinthians 4:8)

Five times I received at the hands of the Jews the forty lashes less one. Three times I was beaten with rods. Once I was stoned. Three times I was shipwrecked; a night and a day I was adrift at sea; on frequent journeys, in danger from rivers, danger from robbers, danger from my own people, danger from Gentiles, danger in the city, danger in the wilderness, danger at sea, danger from false brothers; in toil and hardship, through many a sleepless night, in hunger and thirst, often without food. 2 Corinthians 11:24-27

To keep me from becoming conceited . . . a thorn was given me in the flesh, a messenger of Satan to harass me

2 Corinthians 12:7

Remember Jesus Christ, risen from the dead, the offspring of David, as preached in my gospel, for which I am suffering, bound with chains as a criminal.

2 Timothy 2:9

1. The focus moves from Paul and to Christ

But we have this treasure in jars of clay, to show that the surpassing power belongs to God and not to us.

(2 Corinthians 4:7)

We felt that we had received the sentence of death. But that was to make us rely not on ourselves but on God who raises the dead. (2 Corinthians 1:8–9)

2. A proper expectation of the Christian life

It has been granted to you that for the sake of Christ you should not only believe in him but also suffer for his sake, engaged in the same conflict that you saw I had and now hear that I still have. (Philippians 1:29–30)

I long to see you that I may impart to you some spiritual gift to strengthen you. (Romans 1:11)

I do not write these things to make you ashamed, but to admonish you as *my beloved children*. . . . For I became your father in Christ Jesus through the gospel (1 Corinthians 4:14–15)

I hold you in my heart . . . God is my witness, how I yearn for you all with the affection of Christ Jesus. (Philippians1:7–8)

I wrote to you out of much affliction and anguish of heart and with many tears, not to cause you pain but to let you know the abundant love that I have for you.

2 Corinthians 2:4

When I came to Troas to preach the gospel of Christ, even though a door was opened for me in the Lord, my spirit was not at rest because I did not find my brother Titus there.

2 Corinthians 2:12-13

But God, who comforts the downcast, comforted us by the coming of Titus, and not only by his coming but also by the comfort with which he was comforted by you, as he told us of your longing, your mourning, your zeal for me, so that *I rejoiced still more*. (2 Corinthians 7:7)

You are in our hearts, to die together and to live together. (2 Corinthians 7:3)

Being affectionately desirous of you, we were ready to share with you not only the gospel of God but also our own selves, because you had become very dear to us. (1 Thessalonians 2:8)

We were gentle among you, like a nursing mother taking care of her own children. (1 Thessalonians 2:7)

But since we were torn away from you, brothers, for a short time, in person not in heart, we endeavored the more eagerly and with great desire to see you face to face, because we wanted to come to you—I, Paul, again and again—but Satan hindered us. For what is our hope or joy or crown of boasting before our Lord Jesus at his coming? Is it not you? For you are our glory and 1 Thessalonians 2:17-20

But now that Timothy has come to us from you, and has brought us the good news of your faith and love and reported that you always remember us kindly and long to see us, as we long to see you—for this reason, brothers, in all our distress and affliction we have been comforted about you through your faith. For now we live, if you are standing fast in the Lord. For what thanksgiving can we return to God for you, for all the joy that we feel for your sake before our 1 Thessalonians 3:6-9

Expressing Affection – Some Ambitions
